This month can easily be summed up as a month of celebration in various different ways. I personally love a good celebration. A time when we can joyously come together. Last month it was my birthday and I had underestimated the joy that I felt when I received so many 'Happy birthday' messages through Facebook. It is the times that we live in, that we don't even need to meet people face to face to experience the joy of celebration with others.

On the 15 June the nation will be celebrating King Charles III birthday. The King has two birthdays - the first is in November, as he was born on 14 November 1948. Then a second one - an official celebration - falls on the third Saturday of June called Trooping the

monarch for over 260 years, and then on the 16 June Father's Day. I have always felt that for those who had a difficult relationship with their own fathers, it is good for them to know that we have a heavenly Father who loves and cares for us, which is eternal, and celebrate that fact.

As a parish we will be holding an outdoor service to celebrate God's creation at 10am on the 30 June for our All together Service at St Michaels Church on The Green in Stoney Stanton when we can

celebrate God's goodness to us through experiencing flowers, trees, mountains, rivers, birds, family and friends to name just a few. All are welcome.

In northern colder climates, celebrations often keep people indoors. because the cold and snowy weather makes going outside a difficult and even



unpleasant experience. We hurry from house to car and then into another warm house. In warmer climates, the heat finds us scurrying between air-conditioned buildings. But creation—including the weather— is a gift to be celebrated, not something simply to be controlled and altered. We lose our sense of wonder in nature when we become too absorbed in the structures of everyday life. Most of us have jobs and other responsibilities that may keep us indoors. Thinking of those who work remotely.

The people of the Bible lived much closer to the land than we do today. Navigating by the stars was something they did as a matter of course. Jesus's parables reflect a deep knowledge of flocks, fields, and fishing. We can understand these stories better if we grow in our awareness of creation. Pope Francis, like his namesake, St. Francis of Assisi, calls us to read God's presence not only in our holy books but in the holiness of the world around us, plant and animal as well as human.

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The D-Day Normandy Landings

Eighty years ago, on 6 June 1944, the D-Day Normandy Landings took place. More than 150,000 Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy. The Battle of Normandy ended on 25 August with an Allied victory.

The question of what the *D* stood for has never been absolutely determined: some say it just stood for Day; others maintain it was Disembarkation, because it was an amphibious operation. What is sure is that there was a spiritual dimension. General Eisenhower, the commander of Operation Overlord, urged those taking part to "beseech the blessing of Almighty God upon this great and noble undertaking", and President Roosevelt broadcast a prayer to the nation – the United States, that is.

Before June 5 – the original date for D-Day, before bad weather forced a rethink – a massive and successful series of deceptions were put in place to make the Nazis think the invasion would come elsewhere. The Germans were certainly confused. Hitler, thinking the attack was a feint, refused to send reinforcements, and their strategy was hampered by the absence of their brilliant Commander Erwin Rommel, who was on leave.

Nevertheless, the Americans suffered over 2,000 casualties at Omaha Beach, which was the most heavily defended. Altogether it was reckoned that over 4000 Allied troops were killed, but about 156,000 successfully stormed the beaches, and many landed behind the lines, including American paratrooper Private John Steele, who descended on to the pinnacle of the church tower in Sainte-Mère-Église, the first village to be liberated by the U S Army. Lit up by searchlights, he survived by pretending to be dead, was captured and then escaped, joining the invading soldiers.



This year handmade silhouettes of almost 1,500 servicemen were transported to Normandy for an art installation, *Standing with Giants*, to mark the anniversary.

What's in a name?

June: Alban

Some years ago a small group of us went down to St. Alban's, to share in the annual pilgrimage, commemorating Alban's martyrdom. It was an unforgettable experience. We walked across the meadows from the Roman remains of Verulamium to the place of execution, the point where England's first martyr met his death. Though overlain with legend, the basic story went that the pagan Alban gave refuge to a Christian priest, fleeing from the authorities, probably sometime during the third century. Impressed by the priest's piety, he was converted and when the soldiers came to fetch the priest out if hiding, he took his place, affirmed his Christian faith, and was taken away to be executed. To witness the story, performed with huge puppets in the place where it all happened is incredibly moving. Pilgrims take red roses to the cathedral shrine adjacent to the traditional place of martyrdom, to symbolise the blood of the martyr.

St. Alban is a patron saint of refugees, his name is derived from the Latin *'albus'* meaning white. He is commemorated on 22 June.



Enderby Windband Concert at St Mary's 27 April

Saturday 27 April was a first for St Mary's with thirty-two musicians from Enderby Windband just about fitting into the church for an evening of lively and varied music!

With an audience of nearly eighty people, it was a well filled church!

After a welcome from Pauline, the concert began with a march (Death or Glory) after which the band's conductor Tony Rifugiato entertained the audience by interspersing the music with introductions to each piece.



With a wide range of instruments – from flutes and clarinets to bassoon, French horn and percussion – the audience enjoyed different styles of music from Baroque (Greensleeves) to Classical (Elgar's Nimrod) to selections from some musicals, and film music (including The Lion King, and Pirates of the Caribbean).

I am proud to be a member of the band and play in the flute section. The band members are all of different backgrounds, ages and standards – with some excellent players amongst us. There was very good feedback from the audience after the concert, a number of whom

60 years ago, on 4 June 1964 that the Beatles' first world tour was held. Over two months they played 30 concerts in seven countries, beginning in Copenhagen.

50 years ago, on 28 June 1974 that chemists at the University of California, Irvine, published the first report that warned that chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) could damage the Earth's ozone layer. CFCs were widely used in refrigerators, air conditioning systems and as aerosol propellants.

40 years ago, on 3 to 6 June 1984 that Indian government troops stormed the Golden Temple in Amritsar, which was being held by a Sikh militant group. More than 1,000 people were killed, including the group's leader. The resulting anger and fighting led to the assassination of Prime Minister Indira Ghandi that autumn.

30 years ago, on 6 June 1994 that the highest individual score in first-class cricket was achieved. Brian Lara scored 501 not out while playing for Warwickshire against Durham. It is the only score of 500 or more in first-class cricket history.

15 years ago, on 25 June 2009 that Michael Jackson 'the King of Pop', American singer, songwriter, and dancer, died of an anaesthetic overdose, aged 50. His hit songs included *Thiller, Bad*, and *Black or White*.

10 years ago, on 29 June 2014 that the jihadist group Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIS or ISIL or Daesh) formally changed its name to the Islamic State and declared itself a caliphate. It was formed in 1999 as an affiliate of the terrorist organisation Al-Qaeda.

It was:

200 years ago, on 16 June 1824, that a London vicar, Arthur Broome, and some 22 of his friends, including the MPs William Wilberforce (anti-slavery campaigner) met at Old Slaughters Coffee House to found the SPCA - the first national animal protection society in the world. By1840 Queen Victoria had given permission for it to be called the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

150 years ago, on 22 June 1874, that the first lawn tennis sets went on sale in London. They included balls, racquets, a net, poles, court markers, and instructions. They were designed by Walter Clopton Wingfield, who is credited with having invented modern lawn tennis. Wimbledon began hosting international lawn tennis championships in 1877.

100 years ago, on 8 June 1924 that George Mallory, British mountaineer, disappeared on Mount Everest. His body was found in 1999.

90 years ago, on 30 June 1934 was the Night of the Long Knives: Hitler's execution of a number of senior Nazi officials and hundreds of other (perceived) political opponents.

80 years ago, on 6 June 1944 that D-Day and the Normandy Landings took place. More than 150,000 Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy. The Battle of Normandy ended on 25 August. Allied victory.

Also 80 years ago, on 13 June 1944 that Germany launched the first V-1 flying bomb ('doodlebug') attack on London. 9,521 V-1s were fired at London and south-east England during the war.

75 years ago, on 8 June 1949 that George Orwell's novel *Nineteen Eighty-Four* was published.

70 years ago, on 7 June 1954 that Alan Turing, British mathematician, logician, cryptanalyst, and computer scientist died. Noted for his contributions to code-breaking during World War 2. Considered the father of theoretical computer science and artificial intelligence. Prosecuted for his homosexuality.

George Orwell of Nineteen Eighty-Four



It was 75 years ago, on 8 June 1949, that George Orwell's novel *Nineteen Eighty-Four* was published.

The book focuses on a society dominated by central government, whose citizens are kept in line by force and mind control, and by restricting access to the truth. Orwell invented terms like 'Big Brother', 'doublethink' and 'thoughtcrime', and when later societies seemed to veer in that direction they began to be termed 'Orwellian'. It is

a word that has not fallen out of use in the 21st century.

Orwell's real name was Eric Blair: he was born in India, but his mother brought the family back to England not long after his birth. He lived in many and varied places, ranging from London and Paris to the Hebridean island of Jura, where towards the end of his life – he died of a burst artery in his lung at the age of 46 – he wrote much of 1984. But he loved Suffolk, where he lived at Southwold, and the pseudonym Orwell was inspired by a river in Suffolk.

Orwell described himself as an atheist, a humanist and a social democrat, but he regularly attended Anglican churches – including Holy Communion; he involved himself in their activities and had two Anglican weddings, as well as requesting an Anglican funeral.

For the lucid prose of his work as a whole, Orwell has received many accolades, and *The Economist* described him as "perhaps the 20th century's best chronicler of English culture": he felt himself to be a defender of the working class and of such delights as fish and chips, football and strong tea. He was a journalist, a teacher and a policeman, among other things, but as a novelist he was supreme; other striking work includes *Animal Farm* and *The Road to Wigan Pier*.



Tribute to Lord Field

The Bishop of Bristol, Vivienne Faull, and the Bishop of Ramsbury, Andrew Rumsey, who are the Church of England's joint lead bishops for Cathedrals and church buildings, have issued the following statement:



"We are truly saddened to hear of the death of Frank Field (the Rt Hon Lord Field of Birkenhead, CH) following a period of illness.

"Lord Field was deeply committed to the Church of England. As Frank Field, the active and long-serving MP for Birkenhead, he made time alongside his political career to serve from 2006-2016 as Chair of the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England, the national advisory and decision-making body on changes to the Church of England's cathedrals.

"Under his leadership, the Commission played a key role in shaping major development works at cathedrals including Norwich, Blackburn, Durham and Wells; supported the installation of innovative works of art at St Paul's and Liverpool; and approved the installation of the first solar panels on cathedral buildings in Bradford and Gloucester. He also helped to secure £40 million of funding for Anglican and Catholic cathedrals under the government's 2014-18 First World War Centenary Cathedral Repairs Fund.

"This role followed earlier periods as a member of the General Synod of the Church of England; a Vice-President of the National Churches Trust; Chair of the 2011 King James Bible Trust; and Chair of the Churches Conservation Trust. He was also a member of the Ecclesiastical Committee from 2002 until his death.

"To each role he brought an inquiring mind, a keen sensibility, a drive for action and a deep commitment to the Christian faith.

"We honour the memory of Lord Field and give thanks for all that he contributed to the work of the Church of England, and to wider society."

The disappearance of George Mallory on Everest



One hundred years ago, on 8 June 1924, the British mountaineer George Mallory disappeared on Mount Everest. His body was found in 1999.

The man who may have been the first to climb Everest went missing with his fellow climber Andrew (Sandy) Irvine after setting off for the summit and encountering deep snow and high winds. It was the third attempt on the summit by that year's expedition.

Another member of the group claimed to have seen them making progress very close to the summit, but doubt was later cast on this: it was extremely misty, and the timing did not seem to fit. There have always been claims that Mallory and/or Irvine reached the summit and fell on the way down: the condition of Mallory's body lent some credence to this, as did the absence of his wife's photograph, which he always carried with him and intended to place on the summit. Sadly, his camera, which could have provided undeniable proof, was never found. Nor was Irvine's body.

Irvine was inexperienced but strong, and an expert on the use of bottled oxygen. Mallory was regarded as the most skilful climber on the expedition, with a "natural, catlike ability". He came from a long line of clergymen, and his first climbing experience, aged seven, was on the roof of his father's church, St Wilfrid's, at Mobberley, in Cheshire. When asked on a lecture tour in 1923 why he chose to go to Everest, he replied: "Because it's there."

The expeditions in the 1920s were forced to take a more difficult and longer northern route because of Nepal's refusal to grant access to the southern side of the mountain. Everest was officially first climbed – and safely descended – by Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing Norgay using the southern route in 1953.

Tony Horsfall, a retreat leader and author recommends a different type of prayer....

Using Rest to Pray



Most of us think of prayer as a very demanding activity, but did you know it can be extremely restful?

One of the great verses in the Bible says this: 'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:10). It suggests we experience God most fully when we are still. When we cease rushing around, pausing for a moment of thought and recollection, we are becoming

prayerful, and God is very near. Even a break for a morning coffee can be a moment of prayer, if we slow ourselves down and allow our thoughts to turn towards God.

An essential part of resting is to breathe slowly. Christian tradition has always made a connection between prayer and breathing. You can learn to pray to the rhythm of your breathing, using chosen prayer words to focus. As you breathe in, you might say 'Abba', and then as you breathe out, add the word 'Father'. Choose words which are meaningful to you, deliberately slowing your breathing so you become relaxed and peaceful.

Perhaps you have a favourite chair where you are able to unwind easily. For a few moments sit and do nothing. Simply become aware of the present moment, reminding yourself you are in the presence of God. As you feel yourself relax, bask in the knowledge of God's love and acceptance of you. Sense His smile of approval upon you. You don't have to do anything, just 'be' for a moment. This too is prayer.

Sometimes we are forced to rest by circumstances... illness, disability, growing older and so on slow us down and we can't rush around like we used to do. Never mind. Don't fight against your circumstances. Enter into the place of rest that God is giving you. He loves you for who you are, not for what you do. Turn your thoughts into prayer and offer them to God. You don't need to advise God as to what He should do; simply hold people before Him, leaving the outcome to Him.

Prayer should be a natural expression of our relationship with God. Sometimes we have words, sometimes silence is enough. We don't need to impress God with our fervour. We can relax and be rested, even as we pray.

Would you recognise your GP?

Probably not. The reason is that nowadays, almost half of patients rarely see the same GP twice.

A recent study has found that 47 per cent of adults who visited a surgery more than once in the past couple of years had never, or rarely, seen the same doctor.

Responding to the findings, the Royal College of GPs said that the reason was that there are simply not enough doctors to ensure continuity of care.

Its chairman, Prof Kamila Hawthorne, said: "We know that continuity of care is highly valued by our patients, particularly those with complex health needs, and has significant benefits for the NHS generally." But while continuity of care is important, "it is not always necessary for all conditions."

Meanwhile, the new NHS <u>Long Term Workforce Plan</u>, unveiled last year, aims to increase the number of GP training places by 50 per cent by 2031/32.


The weather was kind to us and it was a lovely afternoon.
