

Dear Friends

September this year brings us new joys and challenges; it has brought the start of a new school year with the excitement that brings. For our parish we have to get used to not having Pauline leading us. During the 20 months she was our priest she reinforced our links with the schools, encouraged us to consider our vocation and calling as people called by God and also encouraged us to look at the way we care for the environment.

It is good that September brings The Season of Creation which is the annual Christian celebration to pray and respond together to the cry of Creation: the ecumenical family around the world unites to listen and care for our common home. The "Celebration" begins 1 September, the Feast of Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christians.



The theme for Season of Creation this year is to hope and act with Creation, and the symbol is the first fruits of hope, inspired by Romans 8:19-25

The biblical image pictures the Earth as a Mother, groaning as in childbirth (Romans 8:22). Saint Francis of Assisi understood this when he referred to the Earth as our sister and our mother in his Canticle of Creatures.

The times we live in show that we are not relating to the Earth as a gift from our Creator, but rather as a resource to be used. "Creation is

groaning" (Romans 8:22) because of our selfishness and our unsustainable actions that harm her. Along with our Sister, Mother Earth, creatures of all kinds, including humans, cry out because of our destructive actions causing climate crisis, loss of biodiversity, and human suffering as well as Creations suffering.

And yet Creation teaches us that hope is present in the waiting, in the expectation for a better future (cf. Romans 8:20-21). To hope in biblical context does not mean standing still and quiet, but rather groaning, crying, and actively striving for new life amidst the struggles.

Creation and all of us are called to worship the Creator, working together for a future of active hope and action. Only when we work together with Creation can the first fruits of hope be born. Just as in childbirth, we go through a period of intense pain, but new life is coming forth.

Our three churches are already seeking to preserve creation with everyday actions and by their Eco Church links; St Michael's has already gained bronze status, St Mary's has gained silver status and St Michael and All Angels is working towards gaining status, what an encouraging sign these are for hope and for new life growing within them.

September also brings us our two patronal festivals and we will celebrate St Mary at the United Service on 1 September at Broughton Astley, then on 29 September we will celebrate the festival of Michael and All Angels at the United service at Croft. This will also be Sebastian's last service before he goes off to university and so we will have an opportunity to thank him for all he has done for music in the parish and wish him well for the future.





The TV shows which can wreck your home

Don't believe everything you see on TV. Especially those programmes which show you how easy it is to do DIY jobs around your house.

A recent survey has found that many people who watch these programmes and decide to 'have a go' at a home maintenance project, only end up causing damage.

In fact, a fifth of DIY enthusiasts end up having to fork out an average of £329, just to repair what they have done to their homes.



HomeServe, who did the survey, says: "Often TV shows make the job look easier than it is, and can lead to costly errors." And any work that requires sign-off to meet regulations should *always* be left to a registered plumber or electrician.

60 years ago, on 4 September 1964 the Forth Road Bridge opened in Scotland. It links Edinburgh to Fife across the Firth of Forth. (A second bridge, the Queensferry Crossing, opened in 2017 and largely replaced it.)

50 years ago, on 8 September 1974 that former President Richard Nixon was granted a full and unconditional pardon by his successor Gerald Ford for any crimes he may have committed or participated in while in office. (Nixon had resigned in August after Watergate.)

40 years ago, on 10 September 1984 that British geneticist Alec Jeffreys discovered genetic fingerprinting, also known as DNA profiling. It allowed criminals to be identified from hair, blood, or sweat left at crime scenes. It also allowed families to trace their lineages or determine the paternity of children.

30 years ago, on 22 September 1994 that Roy Castle, British TV presenter, dancer, singer, comedian, actor and musician, died. Best known as the presenter of the children's TV show *Record Breakers*. He himself broke nine world records while presenting the programme, including the fastest tap-dancing.

20 years ago, from 1 to 3 September 2004 that the Beslan school hostage crisis took place in Russia. Armed terrorists took over 1,100 children and adults as hostages. Russian security forces ended the crisis on the third day, entering the school with tanks and heavy weapons. More than 300 hostages were killed, including 186 children. Hundreds more were injured.

10 years ago, on 18 September 2014 that the Scottish independence referendum was held. The citizens of Scotland voted to remain in the UK rather than becoming an independent country. (Independence: 44.7%; Remain in the UK: 55.3%)

All in the month of September

It was:

400 years ago, on 10 September 1624 that Thomas Sydenham, English physician, was born. He became known as the 'father of English medicine'. His textbook on medicine became the standard medical textbook in England for the next 200 years.

250 years ago, on 4 September 1774 that British explorer Captain James Cook became the first European to discover New Caledonia in the south-west Pacific, during his second voyage.

150 years ago, on 21 September 1874 that Gustav Holst, was born. This British composer, arranger and educator is best known for *The Planets*.

100 years ago, on 25 September 1924 that British racing driver Malcolm Campbell broke the land speed record for the first time. He recorded a speed of 146mph in a 1921 Sunbeam Grand Prix car at Pendine Sands, Carmarthen Bay, Wales.

90 years ago, on 22 September 1934 that the Gresford Colliery Disaster took place in Wales. An explosion killed 266 miners and rescuers. It was one of Britain's worst coal-mining disasters, but the cause of the explosion remains unknown.

80 years ago, from 17 to 25 September 1944 that Operation Market Garden took place. The Allies attempted a massive airborne invasion of German-occupied Netherlands, but they were forced to withdraw. The story was told in the film *A Bridge Too Far*. The operation included the Battle of Arnhem – German victory.

75 years ago, on 1 September 1949 that the Christmas song *Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer* was released. It was sung by the American movie-star and singer, Gene Autry, nicknamed the 'Singing Cowboy'.

70 years ago, on 15 September 1954 that the iconic photograph of Marilyn Monroe's billowing skirt as she stood over a New York subway grate was taken during filming for *The Seven-Year Itch*. The event was staged as a publicity stunt.



What does the course cover?

The course is delivered in thirty sessions of two hours:

Term 1: Exploring Faith:

Sessions include an opportunity to consider our own faith journeys and an introduction to Theological Reflection.

Term 2: God's Call and Our Response:

Sessions include an introduction to the Old Testament

Term 3: Development of the Church:

Sessions include an introduction to the New Testament and Church Doctrine – what we say we believe.

Running through all 3 terms will be evenings entitled Ministry, Mission and Vocation when we will consider how we discern our

gifts, hearing God's call and making our response to God.

Folders of study material will be provided. Written work (or equivalent) is not obligatory but there will be the option of completing one small project or essay each term. For those wanting to progress to further study we will ask for at least one essay during the course of the year.

To learn more about the course, a leaflet will be available in each of our churches.

What's in a name?

This month - Michael

On 29 September we celebrate the feast-day of St.Michael the Archangel. Two of our local churches are dedicated to St.Michael, something which may, surprisingly, reveal a little of their origins! Like many 'Michael Churches' they are built on or near to a stony rise in the ground. This was often done on former pagan sites to symbolise the supremacy of Christianity, Michael was seen as the Angel who overcame evil. And Croft Church, of course is blessed with the entire angel host!

The name, Michael appears particularly in the Bible in apocalyptic writings, particularly Daniel and Revelation, fighting against the powers of darkness. In its Hebrew form it means 'who is like God?', and over the years it has been given as a dedication to many churches and cathedrals, notably, of course in the Midlands to the Cathedral Church of St.Michael in Coventry. The founders of that church were not to know, of course that in years to come, the dedication would be especially relevant, as the Cathedral was all but destroyed by bombing on 14 November 1940.

Michael is often to be found in its feminine form, as Michelle, Michaela, Micheline among others. Of singularly ancient origins in Hebrew, it is still, nevertheless, a well-loved and popular name.



Stoney Stanton's young ringers in London!

On Saturday 6 July 2024 after much preparation over the previous months Tom and Joseph from Stoney Stanton journeyed to London to take part in The Ringing World National Youth contest.

Although Tom and Joseph both ring at Stoney Stanton they were in different Youth teams due to other commitments in their week. Tom in the Leicester Foundry Foxes team and Joseph ringing with Coventry Spires.

For those not in the know The Ringing World is the ringers weekly magazine and The Ringing World National Youth Contest for the Whitechapel Trophy, was first held in March 2011, and was initially conceived as a "one off" event as part of the Ringing World's Centenary celebrations. However, after the resounding success of this first contest, in which twelve teams took part, The Ringing World decided to hold the National Youth Contest again and thus it became firmly established as an annual event in the ringing calendar, held on various Saturdays in June or July.

Each year sees the contest held in a different location in the UK last year was York. This year was London! The day, besides the ringing competition, includes a ringing tour (opportunity to ring at different towers), ringing on mini rings and hand bells. So lots to occupy the teams and those supporting to see and do, whilst waiting for their time slot at the contest tower.

Both Joseph and Tom's teams were in the 8 bell call changes competition. There was also 8 bell method ringing being judged. Plus at another tower 6 bell call changes and 6 bell method ringing taking place. The entry options accommodate various abilities and tower sizes. Call changes are one of the first things a ringer learns after learning how to ring and bell control. Once proficient at call changes they can then begin the process of moving onto method ringing.

Joseph and Tom got to ring at various towers in London during their day there. The headquarters for the day was at St Mary le Bow, and all teams had the opportunity to ring on the world famous 41cwt 12.

Joseph rang the 10th and 11th bells at St Mary le Bow finding it a "great experience although challenging".

Mini rings are a different experience in many ways due to how they are very light bells in comparison to a church tower bell. Often held in a framework that can travel in a small lorry or even a trailer!

The results ceremony in the nave of St Paul's Cathedral at the end of the day was a very special space to be welcomed into. There was a record breaking 37 teams from around the UK (Cornwall to Durham to Kent) in London this year.

After an amazing day of ringing, and ringing experiences it was a further walk, ride on the tube or buses back to get a train homeward bound.

The various ringing associations around Leicester, Coventry and Nottingham all have a youth section. The Young ringers section are to encourage and welcome new young ringing members to join them. If you're interested in learning to ring and are aged 10-11 years old or older then contact your local tower captain or ringing master, to discuss. Learning to ring or volunteering can be part of a section for Duke of Edinburgh awards.
