



Think twice before buying that goat in Ghana

What are you buying your friends for Christmas this year? If you are tempted by 'socially responsible' gifts that involve you NOT giving your friends anything at all, but instead giving your money to a charity 'in their name', you may wish to think again. Such gifts as goats in Ghana or chickens in Chad can make you feel virtuous, but may damage your relationships.

A recent study has found that people who buy others 'socially responsible' gifts can actually be considered to be self-serving and inconsiderate by the people to whom they give them. It seems that such givers often over-estimate how appreciative their friends will be to receive nothing.

A study at the University of Southern California found that to be successful, a gift must make the recipient feel 'extraordinary, and special.' If you suspect giving your various loved ones news about a goat won't achieve that, there is only one solution; instead of giving only socially responsible gifts, insist on receiving only them. Then your mantelpiece will be full of photos of happy goats and chickens, and your family and friends will enjoy your more usual gifts, and still be speaking to you.

Iconic Bethlehem Carol Sheet celebrates 70 years in print

It was back in 1954 when the charity, BibleLands Mission Aid Society, first tentatively decided to print a colourful compilation of popular Christmas carols, alongside images of some of the people BibleLands served.

From the start, the scheme was an immense success. The carol sheets were so popular that even that first year, 100,000 copies were insufficient to meet the demand of schools, churches, British Army bases at home and abroad and Royal Navy ships across the world. The donations appeal towards the BibleLands projects in the carol sheet also raised hundreds of pounds.

When 500,000 copies were quickly sold in 1955, BibleLands knew it had a winner on its hands.

So it was that, in 1956, with 1.5 million carol sheets sales as the target, an accompanying catalogue of Christmas cards and gifts and prayers for God's favour was also launched. The plan was overwhelmingly successful – much needed funds were raised for the work of BibleLands.

Since then, many millions of carol sheets have been sold, until this year the charity, now renamed Embrace the Middle East, has produced a new-look Edition with 27 popular carols, including three new additions for this year: O Holy Night, See Him Lying on a Bed of Straw (Calypso Carol) and The Angel Gabriel from Heaven Came.

Sign for Christmas

Tripping down memory lane

A look through some old Parish Magazines (Part 2)

Last month's article covered the period 1943 – 1984. This one brings us nearly to the Millenium.

In an astonishingly quick turnaround for the Church of England, George Cooper left in October 1984, and a new incumbent was appointed, to take up his duties at the start of the following May. We moved from a guiet, traditional Rector, to a new more adventurous one. Tim Newcombe who came with fresh ideas and the energy of a younger man. In the magazine, little changed. A series started by George Cooper and continued by Mick Vernon on the 'Rectors of Stoney Stanton' continued, there was an article by Rev'd David Jennings on the controversial Bishop of Durham. Social life in the village went on as Carnival Day drew near. But things in the church, were going to change guite dramatically. In a relatively short period of 'six full years' as Tim described it in his final letter, the church had had the massive and hugely expensive restoration of a decaying roof to deal with, the building was reordered to provide a nave altar, and thanks to a generous beguest, was reglazed, with the clear glass you see today. The Alternative Service Book was introduced and in full use, the traditional Book of Common Prayer retained for Evensong and Weekday Communion. Social activity in the church developed, as it had to, to pay the bills, and reached out into the community. Tim was described as having been a 'very visible Rector' as one non-churchgoer put it, when she heard he was leaving.

The magazine too had seen much change. Eileen and Bruce Laurie had moved away to Yorkshire, due to Bruce's employment, and the church lost, at one fell swoop, a churchwarden and magazine editor. The latter was solved by a superb piece of forward planning by Eileen, who appointed a committee of people, to undertake a job she had been carrying out virtually single-handed. The team was most ably headed up by Helen Coombs.


But time moved on and as Tim moved away, down to Cornwall, the parish was fortunate enough to have in situ a very able assistant priest, to care for things during the interregnum. And it will be a familiar face to all present readers of 'Parish News'. Vic Goodman had the care of the parish for the next couple of years alongside his professional work.

A selection of savoury refreshments along with tea and coffee were served. Visitors


were asked to make a donation, and over £300 was raised.

An enormous thank you goes to Claire Jordan and Claire Wooton and their team of helpers for creating such a wonderful atmosphere. I'm not sure how long it took them to switch all the lights on before visitors arrived!! Also grateful thanks to all those who donated their lights.

The magazine itself, in the intervening years had undergone a sea-change. Looking back to the simple magazines of the past, it had become a different publication, brimming with local news, now illustrated, and enjoying an income from advertisements, something which a previous Rector had abhorred in the strongest of terms. And one of the first advertisers, G.Seller, funeral Directors 'had a slot' and they are still with us!

But the parish itself was undergoing change, organisational change. A final alteration to the whole 'look' of things was on the way.

For a little while, and throughout the previous incumbency Stoney Stanton and Croft had become a United Benefice. Now it was going to enlarge yet again. Peter Burrows, the Rector of Broughton Astley would be Priest in Charge of a new unit to include all three villages, and the last of the magazines in the file represents the new order. From being simply 'Stoney Stanton Parish magazine' it became 'Parish News' a group venture between all three churches. Social activities under Peter flourished..... I have to say that in the three churches there seems to have been a lot of sherry offered at Christmas social events that first year! New names arrive, old disappear.



In less than 60 years, there seems to have been a great deal of change, some of it social, some propelled by changing fashion, some by the prevailing thinking of the C of E. It is gently reflected in this small collection of magazines, starting in wartime, ending as we were looking forward to the Millennium. It will be interesting to see what happens in coming years! Who can tell?

All in the month of December

It was:

1750 years ago, on 25 December 274 that the Roman Emperor Aurelian founded the cult of Sol Invictus as an official religion. He erected a temple and declared 25 December a national holiday, to be known as the Feast of the Unconquered Sun. In 336, after the conversion of the Emperor Constantine, 25 December began to be celebrated by the church in Rome as the birthday of God's Son.

500 years ago, on 24 December 1524 that Vasco da Gama, Portuguese explorer, died of malaria. He was the first European to reach India by sea.

200 years ago, on 21 December 1824 that James Parkinson, British surgeon and politician, died. He was the first person to describe Parkinson's disease, in 1817.

125 years ago, on 5 December 1899 that Henry Tate, British sugar merchant and philanthropist, died. He established the Tate Gallery in London.

Also 125 years ago, on 16 December 1899 that Noel Coward, British playwright, composer, director, actor and singer, was born. His plays include *Hay Fever, Private Lives*, and *Blithe Spirit*.

Also 125 years ago, on 22 December 1899 that Dwight L Moody, famous American evangelist, died.

80 years ago, from 16 December 1944 to 16 January 1945 that the Battle of the Bulge (Belgium) took place. German forces launched a surprise assault on the Allies in the Ardennes Forest – their last major counter-offensive operation of the war.

75 years ago, on 13 December 1949 that Jerusalem became the capital of Israel, replacing Tel Aviv.

60 years ago, on 31 December 1964 that Donald Campbell broke the world water speed record, and became the only person to break both the land speed record and the water speed record in the same year.

50 years ago, on 5 December 1974 that the last episode of the TV comedy series *Monty Python's Flying Circus* was broadcast in the UK. It had begun in October 1969.



50 years ago, on 24 December 1974 that British politician John Stonehouse was arrested in Australia (on suspicion of being Lord Lucan.) He had faked his death on 20 November by leaving a pile of clothing on a beach in Miami Florida.

40 years ago, on 3 December that the Bhopal disaster took place in India. A poisonous gas leak at a Union Carbide pesticide plant killed thousands of people and left at least 120,000 with long-term health problems.

Also 40 years ago, on 19 December 1984 that the Sino-British Joint Declaration was signed by Britain and China. Britain agreed to return Hong Kong to Chinese sovereignty on 1 July 1997.

Also 40 years ago, on 31 December 1984 that the Bank of England stopped producing one pound notes. They remained legal tender until 1988.

30 years ago, on 9 December 1994 that Sinn Fein held its first formal talks with the British government. This eventually led to the IRA ceasefire, the Good Friday Agreement, and the establishment of the Northern Ireland Assembly in 1998.

25 years ago, on 1 December 1999 that an international team of scientists working for the Human Genome Project announced that they had mapped an entire human chromosome (number 22). In April 2003 they announced that they had mapped all human chromosomes.

Also 25 years ago, on 2 December 1999 that the UK devolved political power in Northern Ireland to the Northern Ireland Assembly and Executive Committee.

Also 25 years ago, on 31 December 1999 that the London Eye – the world's tallest Ferris wheel at the time, was officially opened on the banks of the River Thames. It opened to passengers in March 2000.

20 years ago, on 26 December 2004 that the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami (also called the Boxing Day Tsunami) took place. A massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and East Africa. It was one of the deadliest natural disasters in recorded history, killing more than 230,000 people in 14 countries.

What's in a name?

December - Nicholas

Imagine the scene!

A young Englishman, working in Amsterdam, heard a noise outside. He looked out of the window and to his astonishment saw that the banks of the adjacent waterway were filled with excited children from the nearby schools. And as he looked, quite mystified, he could see a boat, bearing a figure in full Bishop's gear, and a long white beard being greeted with cheers, as a celebrity, while sweets were distributed among the assembled children. Around him whirled a quantity of other boats, packed with revellers, some in costume, others in their day-to-day clothes all celebrating the occasion!

Sinterklaas had arrived for his annual visit to Amsterdam.

The traditional arrival of the figure, from whom we largely derive our idea of Santa Claus, takes place each year on or around 5 December the Eve of the Feast-day of St.Nicholas. In Holland, this is present-giving time!

The original St. Nicholas was a Bishop of Myra, around whom a whole multitude of legends seem to have accumulated. He was renowned as a miracle worker and soul of generosity, which suits well the later practice of associating him with Christmas gifts. The name Nicholas is a combination of Greek words meaning 'victory of the people '.

Due to the reverence given to St.Nicholas throughout the Christian Church, it has been a consistently popular name for centuries. In the Russian Orthodox church he is a popular saint, the subject of many, heavily adorned icons, created for the reverence of worshippers, reminding them of the sort of people they should be, generous to a fault.

The name has many variations, as is common after so many years of popular usage. Nicola, of course is the feminine version.

The Colours of Christmas

There are several colours that we traditionally associate with Christmas. They are green, red, and gold, and to a lesser extent, white and blue.

Green: Evergreen plants like holly, ivy and mistletoe were used for thousands of years to decorate buildings during the long dark winters. The Romans exchanged evergreen branches in January to wish each other good luck. The ancient Egyptians brought palm branches into their home during the mid-winter festivals. In Europe during the Middle Ages, the 'Paradise tree' which figured in plays about the loss of Eden, was normally a pine tree with red apples tied to it.

Red: This is the colour of holly berries, and it reminded people of Jesus's blood when He died on the cross. Red is also the colour of bishops' robes, which is how St Nicholas came to be portrayed wearing red. Red is also the colour of fire, which keep you warm during cold dark nights.


Gold: This is the colour of the Sun and light. It was the present of one of the Wise Men, and traditionally, was the colour of the star over Bethlehem.

White: This is the colour of purity and peace. It is the colour of the altar cloth at Christmas.

Blue: This is the colour of Mary's robe. It is also the colour of the sky and heaven.
