

Dear Friends

May marks the ending of the Easter season and the beginning of what is affectionately known as 'ordinary time' in the Church calendar. That pivot happens at the feast of Pentecost on June 8th this year. Every Sunday is always a celebration of the resurrection, so it's hard to see what is ordinary about it. The events of the Christ's death and resurrection are the turning point of history. It is a world-shattering event that means life can never be the same again. The book of Acts tells us how the disciples' lives were turned upside down by it. In their grief at the loss of Jesus a number were considering returning to their previous occupations. Once they encountered the risen Lord, they decided to change the world instead!

However, it was not just historical events which changed things. It was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Christian faith has always been a supernatural one. In the struggles to fill rotas, find volunteers, maintain buildings and serve our communities we can easily forget this. If the Christian life was just a set of rules to obey, religious acts to observe and an institution to maintain, it would not have lasted very long.

Trusting in the Holy Spirit to empower and lead is less safe than seeking to control events ourselves. Periodically in the history of the Church the Holy Spirit has broken through in ways that have upended our conventional way of doing things. It happened in the Wesleyan revival of the 18th century, numerous mini revivals in the church and in the great outpouring in Azusa Street in Los Angeles in 1906 that gave birth to Pentecostalism which is now the third largest stream in the Church today.

In many ways it is hard to see how our current institutional predicament can be served by strategic thinking alone or just rearranging areas. I am praying for another (likely messy!) outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Diocese of Leicester. It may be that when you read this some outpouring may have come through the Minster process, although at the time of writing it has not been discerned.

In our parish we are seeing signs of growth, our ministry in schools through Open The Book and to young people with Messy Church see positive progress. Our United Services find people willing to come together to share worship.

Only the Holy Spirit can give us the courage we need for the evangelistic challenge. Only the Holy Spirit can turn the hearts of those currently indifferent to Christian things to help see their need for the Lord. So, 'Come Holy Spirit and kindle the hearts of your people with the fire of your love'. Today, we need that more than ever.

With Prayers for our mission here in our three churches.

The RHS Chelsea Flower Show – world's greatest flower show

20 – 24 May brings us the RHS Chelsea Flower Show. The most prestigious gardening show in the world, it attracts about 168,000 visitors a year. Its cutting-edge garden designs have been called the 'haute couture' or 'World Cup' of gardening.

Here are 12 interesting facts about the Show:

The RHS Chelsea Flower Show is organised by the Royal Horticultural Society.

The Show began in 1913, with about 250 exhibitors in a large single tent. Today the Show covers more than 23 acres with more than 550 exhibitors and gardens, not to mention the Great Pavillion.

The Great Pavillion is HUGE – it covers 2.90 acres, with enough room to park 500 London buses.

The Show has been held in the grounds of the Royal Hospital Chelsea in London every year since 1913, except for gaps during the two World Wars and Covid.

It takes just under three weeks to build a Show Garden, and five days to take it down.

In 1927 there was a campaign to get the RHS to ban foreign exhibits, to reduce competition. The RHS refused, saying 'horticulture knows nothing of nationality'.

The late Queen Elizabeth II attended RHS Chelsea more than 50 times.

It takes 14 judges and two moderators 25 hours to judge and assess all gardens at the show. It takes 50 judges and four moderators three hours to judge all the exhibits in the Great Pavilion.

Garden gnomes have always been banned, except in 2013, the show's centenary year. That year, well-known supporters, including Elton John, Dame Helen Mirren, Joanna Lumley, and Mary Berry – painted gnomes to sell for charity.

Easter in the Parish

Holy Week, was a busy time in the Parish. Following the Palm Sunday services in each Church, we had an opportunity on Monday to follow Jesus' journey by walking round St Mary's Church and meditating on the Stations of the Cross.

Saturday evening the BACSS augmented choir and soloists sang John Stainer's "The Crucifixion". A chance for all to reflect on the events of the last week of Jesus' life on earth.

Easter Sunday saw us gather at St Michael's Church, Stoney Stanton for a United service, when Paul and Blaize were welcomed into the Church by being baptised. To help us celebrate the risen Christ, refreshments were served after the service, including Joan's simnal cake, some hot cross buns, and of course, chocolate eggs!

Grateful thanks to all who helped in any way with the above services and events, and those who came and joined in.

For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate; He suffered death and was buried.

On the third day He rose again in accordance with the scriptures; He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Happy 1700th Birthday, Nicene Creed!

This month, 1700 years ago, one of the most important meetings in the history of the Christian Church began in the Bithynian city of Nicaea. It began in May 325 and went on until the end of July 325.

The Council of Nicaea was convened by the Roman Emperor Constantine, and he had an urgent job for the Christian bishops to do. He wanted them to spell out as exactly as they could the core beliefs of the Christian Church, especially with regard to the person of Christ.

Constantine had good reason to do this: a man called Arius of Alexandria was spreading the idea that Jesus Christ was not divine, but instead was a created being. Such a belief, if accepted, would have changed the very heart of Christianity.

After three months of hard work, the bishops at Nicaea had prayerfully and carefully written down as exactly as they could the core beliefs of Christianity. It became known as the Nicene Creed, and it has been the bedrock of orthodox Christianity ever since.

The Nicene Creed is unique in that it is the only Christian statement of faith that is accepted as authoritative by the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and major Protestant Churches.

It runs:

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father. Through Him all things were made.

For us men and for our salvation
He came down from heaven;
by the power of the Holy Spirit
He became incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and was made man.



Christian Aid

This year's Christian Aid Week (11-17 May) is focusing on Christian Aid's work in Guatemala, Central America, where the climate crisis is causing the seasons to intensify and shift erratically. As a result, farming communities have to battle devastating floods and intense heatwaves. Water sources are drying up and vital crops are failing, plunging farming families into hunger and poverty.

Amelia is a resourceful and determined 24-year-old farmer, and a mother of two, from the Alta Verapaz region. She said the situation is very worrying: 'In the past three years, we've been experiencing high heat and a lack of rain. One of the biggest issues is the lack of water ... my plantations have been dying ... and there is no food for my family.'

Despite the challenges families like Amelia's are facing, the unstoppable power of hope drives people to look for ways to push back.

With training from Christian Aid's partner, Congcoop, Amelia's gaining the skills and knowledge to cultivate native seeds that are better suited to the changing climate. She's planning planting schedules that will deliver multiple harvests throughout the year, making her own organic fertiliser, and constructing rainwater collection systems.



Thinking about Prayer:

The 'Serenity Prayer'.

Quite some years ago now, there was a very lively Bible Group which used to meet once a month, in a member's house in Stoney Stanton.

When the discussion for the day was complete, the meeting would take on a very different but equally valuable discussion over coffee and biscuits, as the ladies involved reminisced about their, by then, long lives. Two of them had served in the Land Army in WW2, others had endured bombing, they had direct experience of the sort of warfare we can only see on our screens today. Their lives had been well lived in the light of their Christian faith.

But one of the group had memories like none of the others, and with her wicked sense of humour, she would often provide the highlight of the meeting. Her memories were not of wartime, but of a more recent past, when she was teaching, and, uniquely, as a clergy wife during the 1960's.

Kathleen Cadle was a much loved member of the congregation at St.Michael's. Her husband had been Rector years earlier, and when he retired, rather than move too far away, they bought a house at Elmesthorpe, meaning that Kathleen could stay in the church where she had been so happy, singing in the choir and earlier than that, running the Sunday School. Brought up a Methodist, on her husband's appointment as Rector, she had to be swiftly confirmed into the Church of England in the Bishop's Chapel in Leicester, with she used to tell us with great glee, a lacy tray-cloth on her head, instead of the customary veil.

But Kath was a woman of profound faith, and she had a favourite prayer, which, she told us, kept her going through the vagaries of parish life.



This famous and popular prayer, was written by Reinhold Niebuhr, an American Lutheran theologian. A Yale-educated critic of liberalism, he belonged to the Protestant evangelical wing of Christianity and was a great ethicist and pacifist. He died in 1971.

His prayer, however lives on. It has become known as the 'serenity prayer' and is used extensively in groups dealing with addiction, and alcoholism.

But for me, it will always be associated with a very wise and amusing friend who was married to our former Rector!



What's in a name? Alexander / Alexandra

Fashions come and fashions go, and as far as names are concerned this is an interesting one. If we look back a few years, we will most of us met older men who were known as Alex, and in Victorian times, the female version of the name would often appear as Alix.

Nowadays we all know about 'Alexa', I am sure. But interestingly many people take the latter part of the name rather than the first half. So we have Zander, which is fast becoming a popular male name, and Sandra, of course has been a well loved name for girls for quite a long time.

Alexander is a name of great antiquity and of distinguished origin. In the female form its earliest mention is in the ancient early Mycenaea form of Greek, Linear-B, which was in existence from 16th - 12th centuries BC. Since those times it has been the given name of monarchs, Czars, Popes and countless writers, musicians and people of note, which is hardly surprising when you look at the meaning of the word. 'Defender of men', 'Protector of mankind' are but two of its derivations. In the New Testament alone it crops up four times. And we cannot leave the subject without mention of the 4th century BC King of Macedonia, Alexander the Great, who as an undefeated empire builder is still regarded as an unrivalled military commander. It would be interesting to know what heights this distinguished name may attain in future!





The story behind the hymn: 'Alleluia, Alleluia! Give Thanks to the Risen Lord'

Not many university students are able to write Christian songs which become worldwide hits, but Don Emry Fishel managed it with his Alleluia No. 1. Nearly 50 years on, it is loved and sung by millions of Christians worldwide.

Fishel wrote it in 1971, while he was a student at the University of Michigan and also music leader of a Roman Catholic charismatic community based in Ann Arbor, Michigan. These were the days of folk songs and guitars, and Alleluia No. 1 fitted the prevailing mood perfectly. Written in E Major, it is ideal for guitar accompaniment.

Mr Fishel became a freelance flutist, flute instructor and composer. He was publications editor for the Word of God and Servant Music for a number of years and then worked in computers for 25 years. In 2008 he moved to Nashville and returned to music, teaching the flute.

Alleluia No 1 was Fishel's first song, written "rather quickly, in about an hour." It had four verses to begin with, but a fifth verse (which became the third verse) was added later, as he prepared for baptism. As Fishel explained, he wanted the line 'We have been crucified with Christ; now we shall live forever' "to be the centre of the song."

Alleluia No. 1 was first published in the UK in Sound of Living Waters, in 1974.

Archbishop of York leads fifth anniversary of National Online Service

The Church of England's National Online Service has recently marked its fifth anniversary, with a special service led by Archbishop Stephen Cottrell.

Since its launch during the first COVID lockdown, the service has become a key lifeline for many worshippers, especially those unable to attend church buildings due to illness, remote living, or other circumstances.

During the past five years the online service has reached millions, providing a spiritual gathering for individuals who are housebound, in care homes, working irregular shifts, in prisons or living in areas with limited access to local churches. Last year alone, the service saw over 21 million views.

Archbishop Stephen praised the service's ability to connect people across the country. "Whether you have been joining us weekly or occasionally, you are very welcome," he said. "These services have connected us as a Christian community and as an online community.

St David's Church becomes a Gold Eco Church

St David's Church in Loughor has become the 75th Gold Eco Church in England and Wales. The award was given by the Christian conservation charity A Rocha UK, and reflects St David's commitment to put creation care at the heart of its mission.

While there are more than 8,000 registered churches with Eco Church, St David's is only the third gold award in Wales to date, and the first in the diocese.

St David's has adapted its worship to regularly include messages and hymns about creation care, and has changed from printed worship sheets to TV screens. Regular community litter picks and recycling points for harder-to-recycle items have been established for a number of years involving the wider community, and its solar panels and associated battery storage, LED lighting, water saving, and toilet and bin twinning have been described as "great examples to demonstrate to others".



Deaf Awareness Week – 5 to 11 May

Deafness is more common than you might think.

According to the Royal National Institute for Deaf people (RNID), one in three adults in the UK are in some way deaf. That means that more than 18 million adults in the UK have some degree of hearing loss or tinnitus.

And it gets worse. Over half the population aged 55 have hearing loss. 80% of people over the age of 70 have hearing loss. An estimated 1.2 million adults in the UK cannot even hear most conversational speech without hearing aids.

How does this work out in local churches? Statistically, it means that in every congregation of 100 members, there will be 14 people with hearing difficulties.

As this month brings Deaf Awareness Week, why not ask the people with hearing loss in our church how they can be helped to hear better in church. This might include:

Installing a loop system, or making sure the one already installed is still working well.

That there is clear visual access to the pulpit and lectern, so that people can lip-read. (Move the flowers and candles?)

Make sure that the speakers do not walk away from the microphones while speaking.

Use some printed and visual media as well as just audio in church communications.
