Bible knowledge

A minister was approached by his small son who told him proudly, "I finally figured out what the Bible means!" The minister thought of his extensive theological library and smiled indulgently. He asked his young son what he thought the Bible meant.

"It's easy, Daddy," the boy replied. "It means: 'Basic Information Before Leaving Earth.'"

Dry

My minister friend put hot-air hand dryers in the rest rooms at his church and after two weeks, took them out. I asked him why and he confessed that they worked fine, but someone had scribbled on the dryer: "For a sample of this week's sermon, push the button."

Canon Paul Hardingham considers a bedrock of our Christian belief: that Jesus is the Son of God.

The Nicene Creed: The Person of the Holy Spirit

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

This month we are considering what the Nicene Creed says about the Holy Spirit.

'We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life': The original version of the Nicene Creed ended simply 'We believe in the Holy Spirit.' However, the phrase 'the Lord, the giver of life' was added to counter the teachings of Macedonius (Bishop of Constantinople), who viewed the Holy Spirit as a creation of the Son. The Holy Spirit is part of the Trinity who shapes us, according to Christ's image, through His fruit and gifts: 'the Spirit gives life...we are being transformed into His image with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit.' (2 Corinthians 3:6,18).

'who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son He is worshipped and glorified': In the late 6th century the Latin churches added the phrase 'and the Son' (the Filioque Clause), which was rejected by the Orthodox Churches. Augustine described the Spirit as 'love proceeding' from the Father and the Son, so we can know God: 'When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, He will testify about me.' (John 15:26).

The Creed is clear that the Holy Spirit is due equal status and worship with the Father and the Son, as a distinct divine person: 'May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.' (2 Corinthians 13:14).

'He has spoken through the Prophets': Why does the Creed include this activity of the Spirit? It is not just referring to the OT prophets, but the whole of Scripture. He has inspired Scripture, so that we have God's word communicated by human writers: 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness' (2 Timothy 3:16). When we read the Bible, the Spirit enables us to hear what God is saying to us.

In what areas of life have you felt the Holy Spirit at work in you?

Bishop Sarah said: "As I respond to the call of Christ to this new ministry, I do so in the same spirit of service to God and to others that has motivated me since I first came to faith as a teenager.

"At every stage of that journey, through my nursing career and Christian ministry, I have learned to listen deeply – to people and to God's gentle prompting – to seek to bring people together to find hope and healing.

"I want, very simply, to encourage the Church to continue to grow in confidence in the Gospel, to speak of the love that we find in Jesus Christ and for it to shape our actions.

"And I look forward to sharing this journey of faith with the millions of people serving God and their communities in parishes all over the country and across the global Anglican Communion.

"I know this is a huge responsibility but I approach it with a sense of peace and trust in God to carry me as He always has."

Lord Evans, Chair of the Crown Nominations Commission for Canterbury, said: "It has been a great privilege to have chaired the Crown Nominations Commission as it sought to discern who God is calling to lead the Church of England and Anglican Communion as Archbishop of Canterbury.

"That discernment began with the public consultation, which heard the voices of thousands of people as they expressed their hopes for this nomination, and continued all the way through to the Commission's final meeting.

"I would like to thank all those who took part in this process, particularly those who took time to share their views in the consultation and the members of the Commission who worked so diligently over several months, ably assisted by the Appointments Secretaries and by the Appointments and Vocations team at Lambeth Palace.

"I shall be praying for Bishop Sarah as she prepares to take up this new ministry in the coming months."

The Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally DBE to become 106th Archbishop of Canterbury



His Majesty The King has approved the nomination of the Bishop of London, the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally, as the next Archbishop of Canterbury, Downing Street has announced.

The 106th Archbishop of Canterbury since Saint Augustine arrived in Kent from Rome in 597, Bishop Sarah will be the first woman to hold the office.

She will be installed in a service at Canterbury Cathedral in March 2026.

Sarah Mullally has been the Bishop of London since 2018, the first woman appointed to that role, and before that was Bishop of Crediton in the Diocese of Exeter. Prior to her ordination in 2001, she was the Government's Chief Nursing Officer for England – the youngest person ever to be appointed to that role at the age of 37 – having previously specialised as a cancer nurse. Bishop Sarah has described nursing as "an opportunity to reflect the love of God".

The Crown Nominations Commission (CNC) for Canterbury nominated Bishop Sarah following a process of public consultation and prayerful discernment that began in February this year. The Canterbury CNC was made up of representatives from across the Church of England, global Anglican Communion and the Diocese of Canterbury.

The most senior bishop in the Church of England, the Archbishop of Canterbury's ministry combines many roles including serving as the Diocesan Bishop of the Diocese of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, as well as primus inter pares – or first among equals – of the Primates of the global Anglican Communion, which consists of around 85 million people, across 165 countries. In the House of Lords, the Archbishop of Canterbury is one of 26 bishops who comprise the Lords Spiritual.



The Book of Common Prayer has such wonderful prayers scattered throughout. It is designed to supply material for every turning on the way. Some of its ceremonies may seem quaint, today, few would wish to attend the 'Churching of Women' after childbirth, as was customary in the past, but it is no bad thing to offer thanks after a serious medical procedure. And while many of the ancient services found in earlier volumes are no longer considered appropriate, alongside the services which accompany us through life, baptism, communion, marriage and funerals, we find orders to use for visiting the sick, prayers for occasional use, prayers for use at sea, so essential at a time when we were so dependent on our Navy, and the Commination.... a most wonderful rant against sinners and wrongdoing! This latter may seem quaint but a lot of it is hugely relevant today..... when you read about slander, or boundary disputes, or unkindness to the disabled, guite apart from the condemnation of immoral behaviour you would expect!

The Book of Common Prayer is an absolute gem, even today several hundred years after its conception, and still legally remains at the bedrock of the Church of England. Its spiritual truths are still worth a visit, even in these cynical times.



Thinking about Prayer

Defend O Lord.....

A special prayer. (the Book of Common Prayer Part 3)

Every Advent Sunday back in the 1940's and 1950;s, and I know for many years afterwards, the Bishop would visit our church to take the annual Confirmation of around 20 - 30 young people. It was an important day for us all, we were told we had reached the 'age of discretion', when we should be able to distinguish between right and wrong! Our confirmation services were inevitably taken by the formidable Bishop Williams (reputed to be the last Anglican Bishop to wear gaiters!). My mother had made me a new white dress for the occasion (later dyed blue for Sunday use) and we all made the procession from the Parish Hall into the church, suitably clad in white veils for the girls and boys equally, for this special day, in new clothes. It would be a memorable occasion.

But singularly precious to me was the prayer, pronounced by the Bishop as he laid his hands on the head of each candidate.

'Defend O Lord, this thy child with thy heavenly grace, that they may continue thine for ever, :and daily increase in thy Holy Spirit more and more, until they come into thy everlasting kingdom. Amen.'

It was a prayer for protection, particularly appropriate for us youngsters as we faced the rough seas of adolescence and puberty. A prayer which, today, all those years later reminds me of the 'circling prayers' – of which more, at a later date.

It is a prayer, not just for once in a lifetime, but a prayer for every day, a prayer for later life, and whatever difficulties and challenges it may present.



What's in a name?

Katherine, Catherine, Kate.....?

Katherine may be described as a name with many variations upon a theme? From the Danish 'Karen' to the Irish and Welsh Caitlyn, it is a popular and much distinguished name. It has been the name of saints and queens down the centuries, and in 1999, St.Catherine of Siena, the great theologian, was proclaimed a patron Saint of Europe, by Pope John-Paul II. An earlier Saint, Catherine of Alexandria, was martyred in the 4th Century and is remembered as having been tortured on a wheel...... hence the firework!

More happily though, the name has a long history, probably having come to this country from eastern Europe during the Crusades. The name itself derives from a Greek word meaning 'Pure', which is why you will sometimes find it written with a K sometimes with a C.

While, in this present age, the diminutives such as 'Katy' are popular, I wouldn't mind betting that this name will become more poplar as the years go by and we are faced with the prospect of another Queen Catherine in this country. The last one was the Portuguese born Catherine of Braganza, wife of King Charles II, but before that we remember three of the wives of Henry VIII, and before that, memorably (thanks to Shakespeare) Catherine of Valois, Queen of Henry V.



Glenda Lewis 24 April 1941—27 July 2025 Memories of Glenda Lewis, shared by her daughter



Glenda had such a full and amazing life, and accomplished so many things. This is just the tiniest glimpse into a life well-lived, of a woman well-loved, who will *always* be missed.

Glenda was born in South Croxton in 1941. She had two older brothers, and eventually a much-wanted sister. Their father, a farm worker and 'special' during the war, had a smallholding and kept a few cows, pigs and chickens. Glenda loved the animals and one of her responsibilities was looking after the chicks when they hatched, and helping her father to deliver milk with a horse and cart was a special treat.

When Glenda was seven years old, the family began an almost nomadic lifestyle, moving wherever work took her father. Despite the frequent uprooting, Glenda excelled at school, – in fact, Glenda lived in 9 different places before she married and always having to leave behind good friends and happy school days had a profound effect on her.

She left school at 16, at first trying Nursing, but quickly found that wasn't for her; and instead, found a clerical job at a large engineering company in Birmingham, while also attending Tamworth College.

When her youngest brother was killed on his motorcycle near to home, it devastated Glenda, her faith getting her through one of the hardest times in her life. Her parents couldn't bear to live in that area anymore, so they moved again, her father managing a variety of different farms, including a short spell in the Enderby area. Whilst there she met a dashing former-RAF

Sullivan - of Gilbert and Sullivan

Some 125 years ago, on 22nd November 1900, Arthur Sullivan, the British composer, died. Best known for his collaborations with the dramatist W S Gilbert on light operas including HMS Pinafore and The Pirates of Penzance, he also wrote the music to the hymn Onward, Christian Soldiers.

Sullivan was born in 1832 in Lambeth. His Irish-born father Thomas was a military bandmaster, clarinettist and music teacher who, from 1845 to 1857 was based at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, where his son became proficient on many of the band's instruments and composed an anthem, By the Waters of Babylon, when he was eight.

Arthur was drawn to classical and spiritual music of various kinds, and his huge success with Gilbert was awkward for him, as he often felt – encouraged by certain reviewers and others – that he was "capable of higher art". He was knighted by Queen Victoria in 1883, and the musical establishment felt this should end his involvement with comic opera.

Sullivan was inclined to agree, but he was also aware of the quality - and popularity - of his work with Gilbert. He had told an American reporter in 1879: "His ideas are as suggestive for music as they are quaint and laughable. His numbers ... always give me musical ideas."

By 1885 the duo had completed The Mikado, their most successful work, which ran for 672 performances.

Sullivan never married, though he had close relationships with a number of women, including the American socialite and singer Fanny Ronalds. He was devoted to his mother and also to his nephews and nieces after his brother Fred died at an early age.

Persistent kidney disease often meant that Sullivan had to conduct sitting down. He died of heart failure following bronchitis. His Te Deum Laudamus was performed posthumously.

pilot, each of them playing tennis with friends. It was love at first sight for Mike, and after some gentle encouragement from her mother, Glenda agreed to a date with him!

A further move took the family to Burton Lazars where Glenda & Mike were married at the church in May 1960.

Glenda became the personal assistant to the managing director of 'Glamour Girl' stockings in Burbage. Whilst working there, when there was talk that Hinckley Hospital would close because it didn't have an x-ray unit, Glenda took it upon herself to send out an appeal to 500 businesses in the Hinckley area, and was successful in raising the funds required to provide the unit. This would be just the beginning of Glenda's charitable work.

After 6 years of marriage, Glenda and Mike moved to Windermere Drive, Croft and some 9 years later, adopted me; and 18 months later, adopted a son.

After 16 happy years there, The Old Rectory came up for auction after being empty for 5 years. Mum and Dad made a successful bid for it and spent many years renovating it, something Mum thoroughly enjoyed, and they spent 26 very happy years there.

Mum's faith was all encompassing; it guided her every day; and every day was about how she could best serve God.

St Michael & All Angels' Church in Croft was Mum's Church for over 40 years, and she was involved in so many aspects of its life - from cleaning brasses, arranging flowers, recreating the Christmas story with a live Shetland pony, Mum served on the church council, PCC and DCC. She helped form and run the Teenage Action Group or TAG group, and with Lester, Derek & Helen, she filled our house with teenagers each week, discussing the Bible and their faith, and also taking them pony trekking in the Black Mountains, camping at Abersoch, roller skating at Granby Halls.

Mum also enjoyed sharing the Old Rectory for Open Gardens, Christmas parties, and all manner of fund-raising events for the Church.

Mum became a member of the Leicester Anglican Cursillo in the mid-1990's and it would become a cornerstone of the rest of her life, also gifting her a love of butterflies. Mum also helped with pastoral care in the community, helping to take prayer and communion to those in the community who were unable to attend church, something she cared deeply about, and after sadly leaving Croft in 2009, Mum became part of Leicester Cathedral's Wholeness and Healing Team, helping those who attended the services each week, sometimes just sitting and praying with them.

Mum gave many teenagers their first jobs, usually odd jobs around the Old Rectory, but there was always something that Mum was organising or helping with where extra help was welcomed. I don't think it's wrong to say that

some felt that Mum was like a second mother to them, and she was a godmother to many more; but perhaps more importantly, she was someone they felt they could talk to, to trust with their worries and concerns, knowing that they would not only get a listening ear, but also truthful & sound advice (whether it was what they wanted to hear or not), and she would always help wherever possible. If you needed Mum, she was there for you.

Mum instilled in us truth, honesty, kindness, strength, respect for others, a very strong work ethic; she taught us to never give up, but always be true to ourselves, our family, and to God.

Mum shared her time and love with so many, and she was many things to many people – wife, mother, daughter, sister, friend... she was 'Aunty Glenda' to most.

Mum was always authentically herself and she lived a life she loved.

She was incredibly well-travelled, going to 100 different countries around the world, and visiting relatives in Australia, New Zealand, the USA; going on spiritual pilgrimages with friends, and mother-daughter trips.

Wherever she was in the world, Mum always found people to engage with and help, especially other mothers, and young people. Mum joined the Mothers' Union in the early 1970s and was a long-standing member of the WRVS.

Like her mother before her, and her daughter, Mum kept many notes. So, I'd like to finish with some words from Mum herself:

"I tried to live my life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ.

I did not live for myself, I put my (parents, brothers, sister, husband, children, family & friends) in first place.

I had a special love for each person, never counting the minutes spent with them; sharing their joys, their successes, their hopes; as well as trials, and the worries and sufferings.

I did everything out of love; to be loved by Father God; to live in the Spirit of our Lord Jesus.

A butterfly has to pass through two distinct stages.

I truly believe we are similar to a butterfly. An active life - feeding and moving about on earth - we become a resting chrysalis, cocooned within our confines. From this chrysalis – and this is where we change – neither moving nor resting – Father God, through our Lord Jesus, enables us to become eternal. Our Spirit.

Mother Teresa's ethos has inspired me and I encompass her biblical strategy. Jesus LOVES each one of us and we must love each other.

My motto is 'to live in Hope and Love'."


